STATE FARMERS

This year the Chillicothe Chapter is fortunate to have two members who will receive the State Farmer Degree April 21, in Columbia at the state convention - Gene Smith and Kenneth Vanlandingham.



To receive the degree a member must have shown outstanding leadership and cooperation, be familiar with the provisions of the state constitution, and have an outstanding supervised farming program.

Gene, as a freshman, had a farming program which consisted of 3 acres of corn and 20 head of ewes; in Ag. II he had 25 head of ewes and 10 acres of soybeans; his junior year his program consisted of 10 acres of soybeans, 30 head of ewes, and 3 sows; in his fourth year his farming program consists of 10 acres of soybeans, 10 acres of corn, 4 sows, and 30 head of ewes.

During the past year Gene has held the office of Chapter Treasurer and served on the decoration committee at the banquet. He participated in the National Corn-picking Contest, he has also participated in the Salvation Army drive.

Gene participated in the meats contest at Maryville and went to the state contest and received a No. II rating. This year he was high point individual in the field crops contest at Maryville.

State Farmers

When Kenneth first started in Vocational Agriculture and FFA work he set his goal to obtain the State Farmer Degree. The degree of State Farmer is the top state award and requires lots of work and planning. Kenneth's parents and Vocational Agriculture instructor are the ones that helped him get started on his way to being a State Farmer.

During his first year he started with a comparatively small farming program consisting of 1 sow, 1 Angus cow and calf, 2 Angus steers, and 8 acres of wheat. Kenneth obtained his livestock from his Dad. During that year and part of the next he worked out the cost of the animals. The crops were paid for at the end of the harvesting season. Since that time he has increased his farming program to the place where he could start farming on a small scale. At the present he has 4 sows and 30 pigs, 2 steers, 3 Angus cows and 2 calves, 1 Angus heifer, 20 acres of corn, and 20 acres of wheat.

During the past years Kenneth has taken part in many activities and is now the President of the Chillicothe Chapter of the Future Farmers of America.

American Farmer Degree

This year the Chillicothe Chapter has one member applying for American Farmer Degree. He is Gary Wilson, graduate of 1958. Gary has an outstanding farming program of 15 sows, 91 feeder pigs, 10 dairy cows, and 16 beef cattle. He owns and rents 330 acres, he also has a crop plan of corn, oats, wheat, rye, red clover, and soybeans.

SUPERVISED FARMING PROGRAM

Our Chapter has a farming program of which we are very proud. It consists of the following: 7 boys have 12 dairy cows; 17 boys have 35 head of beef cows; 11 boys have 31 fattening calves; 16 boys have 59 sows; 10 boys have 57 ewes; 21 boys have 278 acres in corn; 18 boys have 217 acres in beans; and 1 boys has 15 acres in milo.

DISTRICT CONTESTS, 1961

Six of the seven teams entered by Chillicothe FFA won No. 1 ratings in district Vocational Agriculture contests last month on the campus of Northwest Missouri State College, Maryville. The six teams participated in Columbia but results have not been received.

Four teams from CHS won the championship trophies in their events. The first places were in shop, field crops, meat judging, and dairy products. Forty-five schools competed at Maryville and no other school received more than two No. 1 ratings.

The contestants from here won 18 No. 1 ratings as individuals. One local team received a III rating and there were three individual ratings of III.

Results:

SHOP - First place trophy. Sam Gibson was high individual in the entire contest. Charles Pollock was third high. Bill Pray was the third member of the team.

FIELD CROPS - First place trophy. Gene Smith was high in the contest and Bill Mast was third. Jim Donoho was the third member.

MEAT JUDGING - First place trophy. Gary Cooper was high in the contest and Larry Hershberger was second. Carl Cole was the third member of the team.

DAIRY PRODUCTS - First place trophy. Individually in the contest Dell Gaston was tops among all entrants, Bob Eckert second and Gary Hurst third.

SOILS JUDGING - Second in the contest. Bill Mast was high in the contest. Other members from CHS were Wayne Cunningham and Jim Donoho.

DAIRY CATTLE - Third in the contest. Team members were David Walker, Bob Eckert, and Gary Hurst.

ANIMAL HUSBANDRY - Did not qualify for state. Members were David Walker, Bill Pray, and Gene Smith.

Members of the meats team were required to identify meat cuts and judge carcasses.
